"Roanoke Conundrum - Fact & Fiction, An International Symposium"

A Great Success!

October 6-10, in an extraordinary culmination of the 75th Anniversary of *The Lost Colony* production, the organizers at the Roanoke Island Historical Association (RIHA) produced: *Roanoke Conundrum—Fact & Fiction.* The symposium was designed as a unique gathering of scholars from around the world to the remarkable emergence of new research that is stimulating excitement and discussion on Sir Walter "Ralegh's" explorations and settlements on the Carolina coast in the 1580s...and particularly the story (*in fact and fiction*) of "The Lost Colony."

The five-day symposium explored not only the historical facts as we know them, but how the arts interpret history in many different forms. Speakers came from all over the United States and abroad including Jane McCulloch, playwright, author and Artistic Director for the English Chamber Theatre and Opera UK.

The PG Foundation was represented by Mark Sumner as he presented: "Interpreting History with Symphonic Drama" on the final day of the symposium. The programs were free to the public.

In discussion:

The Paul Green Foundation and the Roanoke Historical Association (RIHA) are in preliminary discussions with **Huntington Williams**, a Baltimore writer of a screenplay entitled: *The Lost Colony*. This "fantastical" storyline follows a family who, while vacationing on the Outer Banks of North Carolina, become entangled in the story of the lost colonists – beyond their wildest imaginations. Mr. Williams is working with the Foundation and RIHA as he prepares his screenplay manuscript for purchase.

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
